

## Year 3 Stone Age

At Merridale, history, geography, art and design and technology are taught through a topic based approach which we call discover.

## History

Children will look at what it was like in the Stone Age and Iron Age. They will learn what BC and AD mean. They will learn that the Stone Age began over 2 million years ago and was split into into three periods: Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic. They will use a timeline to compare lengths of different historical periods.

Children will look at primary sources from the Paleolithic and Mesolithic period such as skeletons, jewellery and weapons.

Children will also observe houses found in Skara Brae and infer what they tell us.

We will also understand what an archaeologist does.



## Art and Design

Children will look at stone age cave paintings which have been found all over the world with the oldest being found in Europe.

Many cave paintings show animals and hunting scenes but some have human handprints. They use natural colours because their paints were made from natural materials.

The children will have a go at recreating their own cave painting using paints and charcoal.
