Jewellery Policy


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PLEASE HELP TO KEEP YOURSELF AND OTHERS SAFE WHILE CASES OF COVID-19 ARE INCREASING.

The three main symptoms of COVID-19 are:







New continuous cough



Change to how things taste or smell

If you have any of these signs, you must **stay at home** and book a free PCR test as soon as possible.

A PCR test is for people who think they have symptoms of COVID-19. It is a swab test that is sent to a lab to be analysed.

Sometimes, people with COVID-19 do not have the three main symptoms listed above. Instead, they have any of the following symptoms:



Diarrhoea



Sore throat



Muscle or full body aches



Tired and unwell



Headache that lasts a long time



Blocked or runny nose



Sickness or vomiting

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PE Kits

To avoid bringing PE kit from home, we are asking that children come to school wearing their PE kit on their PE day. Please ensure that children wear suitable clothing (tracksuit bottoms/ shorts, t-shirt, sweatshirt/fleece) on their PE day as they will stay in these clothes all day. Children will need suitable outdoor footwear (trainers) on their PE day and also ensure that long hair is tied back, jewellery/ watches are removed or covered with plasters/sweat band.

Year 3 have PE on a Monday Year 6 have PE on a Tuesday Years 1 and 2 have PE on a Wednesday Year 4 have PE on a Thursday Reception and Year 5 have PE on a Friday

Please note that only watches and stud earrings are allowed to be worn in school at any time but these must be covered or removed for PE for safety.

Dinner Money

Dinner money is £2.30 per day (£11.50 per week). SimsPay is the preferred method of payment please. Please ensure all dinner money is paid at the start of the week.

Some parents and carers in receipt of income support and Working Family Tax Credits are entitled to free school meals and milk. Please ask at the school office for more information.

All children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are eligible to receive a free school meal everyday under the Universal Infant Free School Meals funding.

Parking restrictions

Please can I remind you that the school car park is for staff use only. Please park outside of school where it is safe and legal to do so.

Please can I also ask that you respect our school neighbours by not parking in front of drop-down kerbs.

Face masks and Face coverings

When not teaching, supporting children, eating or drinking, all school staff are now required to wear face masks in school.

Please can we ask that parents and carers also wear face masks when entering the school site.

Face masks MUST be worn in the main school entrance area

Outdoor Learning

Government advice is for learning to take place outside wherever possible. Children will be going outside as often as the weather allows so please ensure they are dressed appropriately for this and have a warm coat and appropriate footwear.

We also ask that all children bring a named pair of wellies to keep at school please.



<u>Daily Testing for Close Contacts of those</u> <u>with COVID-19</u>

People who are fully vaccinated or children between 5-18 years and 6 months that are identified as a close contact of someone with COVID-19 should take a Lateral Flow test everyday for 7 days and can continue to attend school as normal. Unless they have a positive test result or develop symptoms at any time —in this case, a PCR test and isolation pending the result is required.

Children under 5 years old do not need to take part in daily Lateral Flow testing but can do so at the discretion of their parents and carers.



Rise to the

Reading Challengel

We expect ALL children at Merridale to read (or enjoy a book with someone else) for <u>AT LEAST 20 minutes at least five times a week!</u>

Evidence from research shows that children who read <u>daily</u> are more successful learners, leading to increased confidence and enjoyment of reading.

The **role of parents and carers** is central to your child's success with this challenge. Older children may enjoy reading independently each day, however, younger children will require an adult to read with/to them in order to meet their target.

Please ensure that you provide a quiet space for your child to read at least 5 days per week at home and <u>sign</u> their reading record to confirm that they have read for at least 20 minutes.

Children may read their school reading book or library book. They may also read any other book that they might choose. All of these should be noted down in their reading record and signed by a parent/carer. Just note the date, book title and how many pages have been read and sign in the comments box. If you also wish to write a short comment on your child's reading, that would be great!

At the end of each week, every child who has read for at least 5 days (if not

more) will receive a sticker for their class reading chart. The children with the most stickers at the end of each half term in each class will receive a small reward.





Safe and Legal Parking outside Merridale Primary School

PLEASE KEEP OUR CHILDREN SAFE

The overriding reason for this guidance is to keep our children safe outside our school gates and to respect our neighbours whilst also making sure parents and carers do not break the law.

Drivers, parents and carers who break the law can be issued with a penalty charge notice (fine).

We know that the school run can be a stressful time. The last thing we want to do is make it harder, but it's really important for everyone's safety that you observe the rules and park safely. That's why it's a good idea, if you drive your children to school, to get here early and look for somewhere <u>safe and legal</u> to park.

Can I park on double and single yellow lines?

No. Please do not park on any yellow lines. Cars parked there can obstruct lines of sight for pedestrians who want to cross the road. Any car left unattended on a single or double yellow line for more than a few minutes can be issued with a penalty charge notice. You are only allowed to stop on double or single yellow lines for a short period of time to allow passengers to enter or exit the vehicle, providing no obstruction is being caused.

Can I park on school zig-zag or keep clear markings?

No. In the interests of safety, you should <u>never</u> park on those markings. Any vehicle found on them can be issued with a penalty charge notice. This also applies to Blue Badge Holders.

Can I double park if I remain in my vehicle?

No. This causes an obstruction for other road users and is a danger to pedestrians.

Can I park over drop-down kerbs in front of the houses opposite school?

No. This causes an obstruction and means that our neighbours around school are not able to get on and off their drives.

Can I park on the school car park?

No, this car park is for <u>staff only</u>. Parking on the school car park causes an obstruction for staff and is a safety risk for staff, pupils and families who might be crossing the car park on foot.

You must also make sure your child is using the correct child seat, restraint or booster seat when driving. Children under 135cm tall require a booster seat by law to ensure that they are safe when travelling in a vehicle.
